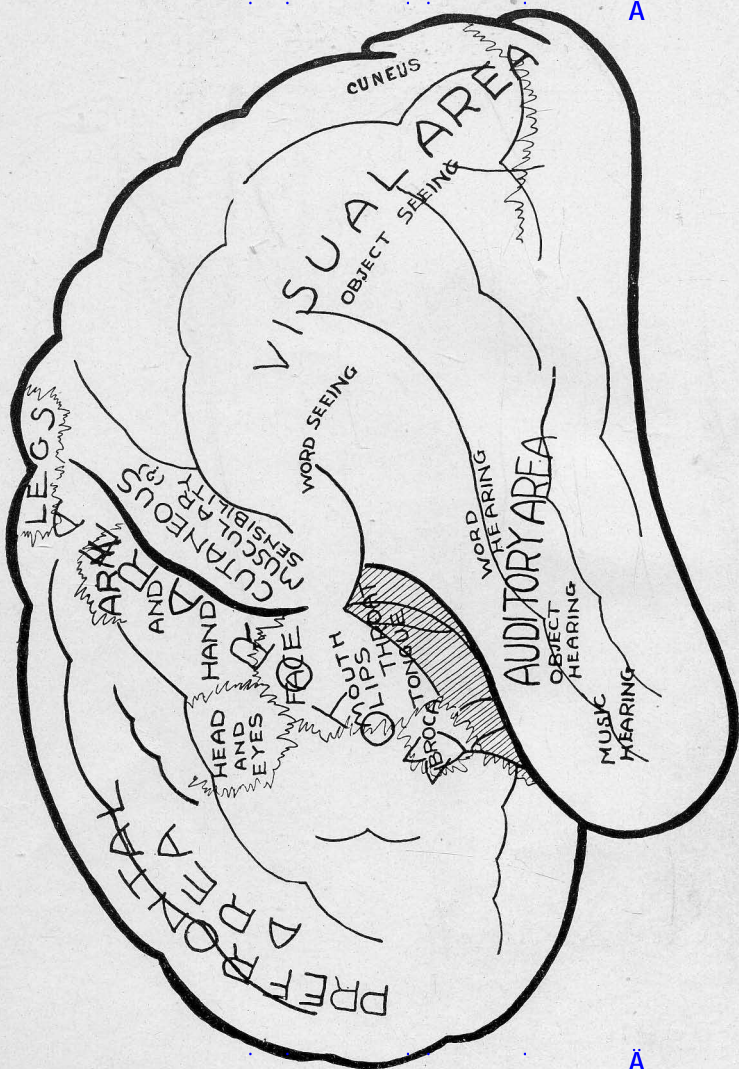



DIAGRAM OF THE FUNCTIONAL AREAS ON THE SURFACE OF THE
