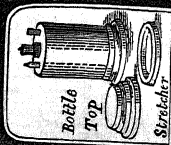
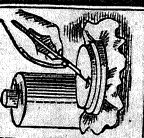

TWO-GUINEA SEASON TICKETS between London (London Bridge, Victoria, and Kensington), and also between all intermediate Stations from London Bridge to Victoria, Kensington, and Croydon, and the Crystal Palace Station, are issued at the Secretary's Office, at London Bridge, to holders of the Crystal Palace Company's Season Tickets, subject to special conditions.

To persons *having a home*, but without the means of support, a pension of £20 a-year is given ; thus, the family circle is unbroken, and the invalid is relieved from the pain of dependence.

The Institution is NATIONAL in its character, and persons from all parts are admitted to its benefits.

Persons subscribing at least HALF-A-GUINEA annually, or FIVE GUINEAS at one time, are Governors, and are entitled to Votes in proportion to the amount.

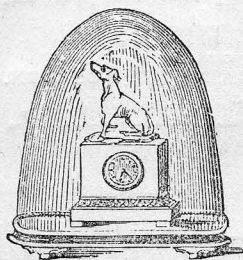
