## A BALTIC CRUISE.

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*Monday, May 11th, 1896.*

AT 10 a.m. on a warm spring morning I find myself one of a company of about 170 tourists, at King's Cross Station, in the Flying Scotchman. We reach Grantham, in Lincolnshire, 105 miles, at 12 o'clock; then York, 188 miles, at 1.45; and passing Durham, with its venerable cathedral, at 3.42 p.m., we arrive at Newcastle, our third stop, 272 miles from London.
