The ports, coast, and islands described in this volume have been visited by the United States steamer *Gettysburg*; the work was written either at the time of the visit or as soon after as practicable. The "*Pilote des Côtes Sud de France*" (1876), by A. Germain, Ingenieur Hydrographe de la Marine, and "*Instructions Nautiques sur les Côtes de Corse*" (1865), by M. Sallot Des Noyers, Capitaine de Frégate, have been consulted. The most recent charts and publications, nautical and statistical, have been examined.

The views on plates 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 19, 21, 22, and 25 are reproduced from French charts and books, with corrections made on board the *Gettysburg*; those on plates 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 24, 26, 27, 28, 29, and 31 were procured from the Italian Hydrographic Office plates, through the kind liberality of Captain Magnaghi of the Italian navy; those on plates 18, 20, 23, 30, and 32 were made on board of the *Gettysburg*.
